Family Support Center Reopens Its Doors to the Community!

he Family Support Center (FSC) is the star of Transition House's Homelessness Prevention Program. This evening education program offers seminars designed to improve income earning capacity, teach money management skills and goal setting strategies, and promote effective interpersonal communication and parenting techniques. Workshops are also offered that allow participants to improve overall health and well-being and minimize stress.

The FSC is not just for parents from our shelter—now low-income persons from the community who want to gain greater economic and interpersonal stability are welcome to enroll in our free evening workshops. Our four core offerings include English as a Second Language, Mindful Parenting in collaboration with New Beginnings Counseling Center, Employment Education, and Financial Literacy. Classes are offered in five-to-eight-week sessions, with each session taking place one night a week, Monday through Thursday. Sessions in both English and Spanish are available for each offering. The FSC is located at our administrative office building at 425 E. Cota Street.

Individuals can also access our dropin Computer Lab, where they will receive assistance accessing resources designed to bridge the digital divide for families experiencing poverty. Such resources include help enrolling in Covered California health insurance,

signing children up for school, income tax preparation, waitlist placement for affordable housing, housing searches, resume preparation and job searches—and the list goes on. In addition, they can benefit from one-on-one training by our staff in a variety of basic skills that range from navigating internet and social media safely, to learning Microsoft Office applications.

To remove barriers parents may face to furthering their education, our Family Support Center offers free onsite childcare during workshop hours. While adults attend classes or access the computer lab, their children can

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Buckley Kelley Place Welcomes Families Home

hree formerly homeless families are delighted and grateful to find a place to call home at Buckley Kelley Place, Transition House's newest affordable housing development. The project, located near downtown on Salsipuedes Street, welcomed these tenant families in June.

The property's three homes were named for long-time Transition House supporters and shelter volunteers, Jim Buckley and Patty Kelley, along with their two children, Katie and Conor.


The houses were acquired with funding provided by the City of Santa Barbara's Community Development department. The property was purchased early in 2020. But before it underwent extensive remodeling, the original houses were used to isolate shelter families with Covid-19 that were moved there to quarantine during the first two years of the pandemic.

In 2022, Transition House began extensively rehabilitating the houses, including replacing all the electrical and roofing, remodeling kitchens and bathrooms, and doing extensive landscape work. The configuration of the homes includes one three-bedroom and two two-bedroom units, and each has a small private outdoor area that is fenced so young children can play safely.

The three families that now occupy the property include a three-generation household, a single working mom of two, and a disabled mom with her two teenage daughters. They love their new units, the comfortable floorplans, and the wonderful outdoor areas! They look forward to many happy family times spent at home together in the future.




Jim, Patty and Conor celebrate the opening outside of Katie's House.

Storyteller at Transition House—A Perfect Partnership

ransition House is delighted to announce a new partnership with longtime local non-profit and early childhood education center, Storyteller Children's Center, who recently assumed operations of Transition House's licensed Infant Care Center.

Transition House has operated onsite, licensed infant care for families living in our shelter and housing since the early 1990s. We founded the center because in our work with homeless families, we realized a significant barrier to parents getting back to work was the lack of affordable childcare—specifically infant care for children ages six weeks to two years. In addition, we knew that parents who have lost everything are sometimes reluctant to place their children in care—the trauma of homelessness causes Moms and Dads to want to keep their little ones close. Having infant care onsite with caregivers they trust has alleviated the concerns of many parents who are returning to the workforce.

For many years, we have made referrals to Storyteller's toddler and preschool programs. The sole mission at Storyteller Children's Center is to provide high-

quality, early childhood education to homeless and low-income families while offering children and their parents comprehensive support services. Many of the babies who began infant care in our facility would

then transfer at age two to Storyteller's toddler facility located about two miles away. Storyteller sets the standard for trauma-informed early childhood education in our community and has been around for over two decades; it made sense to see if there was a way to further our partnership.

In the Fall of 2022, we began meeting with Storyteller leadership to explore the idea of combining forces and having Storyteller run the operations of the Infant Care Center. This would allow both agencies to truly focus on what each does best. Transition House could continue to provide comprehensive case management to support families experiencing housing instability, and Storyteller could expand their offering of therapeutic early childhood education to the youngest of learners. Local funders agreed, and we received encouragement to move forward. Eventually, Storyteller assumed oversight of the Center under its own license, beginning on July 1, 2023, and appropriately changed the name of the Center to Storyteller at Transition House.

Storyteller brings its expertise in early

childhood development to the program, offering better training and advancement opportunities for staff. Storyteller's multiple childcare sites and larger staff-base offer the Infant Care Center many resources to draw from. Storyteller will build upon the care already provided to families in the infant care center, which has utilized ASQ assessments, Learning Stories, and ongoing teacher training.

The terms of the merger give each agency the opportunity to offer its best resources. Transition House is contributing the use of its Infant Care Center facility free-of-charge to Storyteller. Storyteller, in turn, hired Transition House's staff, absorbed the existing clientele, and assumed all operations of the Center. They will continue to provide free or subsidized infant care to our families, and Transition House will offer free, onsite evening parenting classes for all Storyteller parents. These classes work to address gaps in skills, and offer resources to families that need extra support.

We are very excited to see this merger come to fruition, and grateful to the dedicated staff and leadership at Storyteller for working hard to make it happen. \uparrow







Yardi Staff Uses Teamwork to Build Bicycles for Families

ardi Systems, an international property management software company whose head-quarters are located in Goleta, has been a longtime supporter of Transition House.

This year, they reached out to see if their staff could make a contribution of bicycles for families living in our transitional housing facility.

They were conducting a training conference for over fifty of their human resources staff members from offices around the world hosted at their Santa Barbara location. They were looking for a service project to include in their conference offerings.

Attendees were unaware that bike building was on the agenda. On the day of the build, they were placed in teams of three people and had to build a bike with only a simple instruction sheet and a minimal collection of tools.

At first, Yardi staff approached the project with some hesitation; looking up how-to's on cell phones was forbidden. But quickly, their teams attacked the task and found ways to work together to accomplish this goal. There was a professional bike tuner onhand to check each finished bicycle for proper assembly and safety. The pro would also answer one question per team, if needed, during the process.

At the end of the day, beautiful new bikes were assembled and provided to enthusiastic Transition House families, and Yardi staff got to know each other better. One final take-away from the project—it really is better to wear jeans to a work-related conference!

do homework, read, and play games with our caring Children's Program leaders and dedicated volunteers. Older children are allowed to spend time in the computer lab doing homework or participating in computer-based lessons such as typing. While at the Family Support Center, children interact with positive adult role models who provide tutoring and supervision, and benefit by witnessing their parents take proactive steps towards improving their family circumstances through education.


